CIGI and our "sister" institution the Canadian International Council (CIC) are members of the hemispheric group of Foreign Relations Councils.

We hosted that group last year at our headquarters in Waterloo to demonstrate our interest in the region,

I, and my colleague, Jennifer Jeffs, CIGI's Deputy Executive Director, are representing CIGI here today to certify that interest.

I understand that today's goal is to propose an agenda for the next summit of the Americas.

It is important work, and CIGI is glad to play its small part in facilitating it.
